General Purposes Committee of Council

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **25 July**, unless notice of a resolution calling upon

Council to annul or amend the regulation is received by the Registrar by **noon on 21 July** (as set out in section 19 (1) (a) of [Statute VI: Council](#)).

(a) Regulations for the Besroul Endowment for Global Primary Care Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gift from Dr Sadok Besroul.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 24 of 2002](#), concerning Academic and Other Posts, insert the following:

‘Besroul Endowment for Global Primary Care Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts from Dr Sadok Besroul to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Besroul Endowment for Global Primary Care Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund:

(1) towards the salary and expenses of the holder of a Professorship of Global Primary Care and associated overheads. The Professor shall undertake research, lecture and give instruction on the improvement of global primary health care; and/or

(2) to support the costs of a research centre for the improvement of global primary care. Such costs may include, without limitation, the costs of fellowships, scholarships, annual conferences, administrative support and research support for the Centre.

4. The Professorship shall be known as the Dr Sadok Besroul Professorship of Global Primary Care.

5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Medical Sciences Board.

6. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;

(2) the head of the college to which each Chair may be allocated by Council from time to time, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;

(6)–(9) four persons appointed by the Medical Sciences Board;

(10) a person holding a clinical appointment by the relevant NHS body with which the post-holder may hold an honorary contract.

At least three members of the board, of whom one shall be a professor, shall hold clinical appointments.

7. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 27 April 2046, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

8. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund and the Professorship.

9. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

10. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.

11. Regulations 1–5 and 7–13 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

12. Subject to regulation 13, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of

Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

13. Any amendment to the main object as set out in regulation 3 must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.’

(b) Regulations for the Hamish and Ann Orr-Ewing Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the legacy gifts from Hamish and Ann Orr-Ewing.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 25 of 2002](#), concerning Trusts, add:

‘Hamish and Ann Orr-Ewing Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude legacy gifts from Hamish and Ann Orr-Ewing to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Hamish and Ann Orr-Ewing Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards supporting the Department of Engineering Science.

4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Mathematical, Physical and Life Sciences Board.

5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund.

7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

8. These Regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

10. Any amendment to the main object(s) as set out in regulation 3, must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.’

(c) Regulations for the Michael Huffington Chair of Eastern Orthodox Christianity Fund

Explanatory Note

These new regulations are made to formalise the trust created by the receipt of the gift from The Hon Michael Huffington.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 24 of 2002](#), concerning Academic and Other Posts, add the following:

‘Michael Huffington Chair of Eastern Orthodox Christianity Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude gifts from The Hon Michael Huffington to be held as permanent endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Michael Huffington Chair of Eastern Orthodox Christianity Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment; and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards the salary and expenses of the holder of a Chair of Eastern Orthodox Christianity and associated overheads. The Professor shall undertake research, lecture and give instruction in the field of Eastern Orthodox Christianity. If the salary, expenses and overheads of the Professor are wholly or partly covered from other sources or there are further funds available, there shall be discretion to apply the income and/or capital of the Fund to support the Professor’s research.

4. The Professorship shall be known as the Michael Huffington Chair of Eastern Orthodox Christianity.

5. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

6. The Professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor;

(2) the Warden of Merton College, or, if the Warden is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the Governing Body of Merton College;

(3) a person appointed by the Governing Body of Merton College;

(4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;

(6) the Head of the Humanities Division, or their nominee;

(7)–(9) three persons appointed by the Board of the Faculty of Theology and Religion.

7. (1) The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 2 February 2046, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

(2) Subject to regulation 7 (1) where the income in any given year exceeds 4.5% of the value of the Fund, the University shall accumulate the income in excess of 4.5%.

8. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund and the management and administration of the Fund and the Professorship.

9. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

10. The Professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.

11. Regulations 1–5 and 7–13 shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

12. Subject to regulation 13, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

(1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or

(2) be outside the objects of the University.

13. Any amendment to the main object as set out in regulation 3 must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.’

(d) Regulations for the Refugee Studies Centre Fund

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 25 of 2002](#), concerning Trusts, add:

‘Refugee Studies Centre Fund

1. The University receives with gratitude a legacy gift from Dr Robert Conway to be held as expendable endowment on the trusts declared in this regulation. Further money or property may be paid or transferred to the University as either expendable or permanent endowment to be held on the same trusts. The assets so held will be known as the Refugee Studies Centre Fund (“the Fund”).

2. The University shall retain as permanent endowment those of the assets in the Fund (if any) which are contributed on the express understanding that they are to be treated as permanent endowment (“the Permanent Endowment”).

3. The University shall (a) apply the income of the Permanent Endowment (if any); and (b) apply the income and, in its discretion, the capital of the remainder of the Fund, towards supporting the work of the Refugee Studies Centre.

4. The administration of the Fund, and the application of its income, shall be the responsibility of the Social Sciences Board.

5. The University may in its absolute discretion in the period ending 21 years from the date of this regulation, instead of applying the income of the Fund in any year, accumulate all or any part of such income by investing it, and holding it as part of the capital of the Fund. The University may apply the whole or any part of such accumulated income in any subsequent year as if it were income of the Fund arising in the then current year.

6. The University shall have power to pay out of the capital or the income of the Fund all costs of and incidental to the creation of the Fund, and the management and administration of the Fund.

7. The University may exercise any of its corporate powers in the management and administration of the Fund in so far as those powers are not inconsistent with these regulations.

8. These regulations shall be deemed to be Trust Regulations under the provisions of Part D of Statute XVI.

9. Subject to regulation 10, Council may amend, repeal or add to these regulations in accordance with Part D of Statute XVI, but no amendment is valid if it would cause the Fund to:

- (1) cease to be exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales; or
- (2) be outside the objects of the University.

10. Any amendment to the main object(s) as set out in regulation 3, must be approved both by Congregation of the University and subsequently by His Majesty in Council.’
