General Purposes Committee of Council

The General Purposes Committee of Council has made the following changes to regulations, to come into effect on **27 June**, unless notice of a resolution calling upon

(a) Professor of Environmental Geography

Explanatory Note

These proposed changes are to better reflect the academic needs of this post in the School of Geography and the Environment (SoGE). The post is currently vacant. This proposal has the support of SoGE, Linacre College and the Social Sciences Division.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 24 of 2002](#), concerning individual professorships, amend the Professor of Environmental Geography as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

‘1. The Professor of Environmental Geography shall undertake research in Environmental Geography and shall lecture and give instruction in that subject.

2. The professor shall be elected by an electoral board consisting of:

(1) the Vice-Chancellor, or, if the head of the college specified in paragraph (2) below is Vice-Chancellor, a person appointed by Council;

(2) the head of the college to which the professorship shall be for the time being allocated by Council

(b) 1971 Professor of Geography

Explanatory Note

These proposed changes are to better reflect the values of the School of Geography and the Environment (SoGE) and its academic community. This proposal has the support of the current postholder, SoGE, St Peter’s College and the Social Sciences Division.

Text of Regulations

In [Council Regulations 24 of 2002](#), concerning individual professorships, amend the 1971 Professor of Geography as follows (new text underlined, deleted text struck through):

Council to annul or amend the regulation is received by the Registrar by **noon on 23 June** (as set out in section 19 (1) (a) of [Statute VI: Council](#)).

under any regulation in that behalf, or, if the head is unable or unwilling to act, a person appointed by the governing body of the college;

(3) a person appointed by the governing body of the college specified in paragraph (2) above;

(4), (5) two persons appointed by Council;

3. The professor shall be subject to the General Provisions of the regulations concerning the duties of professors and to those Particular Provisions of the same regulations which are applicable to this chair.’
